

Nomination Statement: Student Voices was established last year in response to a directive from Superintendent Theresa Alban that four area high schools address the negative perceptions and racial and cultural biases that had infected their athletic competitions and other student and community interactions. The students chosen to take on this task at Governor Thomas Johnson were recommended by teachers and club leaders because they were open minded, positive, and would be committed to supporting and promoting our school. Our Student Voices members met to discuss the positive and negative aspects of our school, and talk among themselves about interactions with students from the other schools. They then met with the representatives from the three other schools to discuss their perceptions and experiences, with the goal of finding ways to promote the positive and eliminate the negative. "When I was twelve, I realized that peace cannot coexist with hunger and poverty. Then I learned that the best way to end hunger in developing nations is to educate teenage girls. I had found my life's work. My nonprofit, Educate Girls to Eradicate Hunger, Inc., has now provided tuition, room & board, and uniforms to 34 girls in Malawi. My "Educate Girls Superhero 5K" attracted 150 runners from 7 states! Learning of my own indigenous heritage, and the damage done to indigenous cultures by imperialism, I also founded the Indigenous Peoples Literature Society. Since June 2019, I have led workshops at my public library, a runners' expo, a youth summit, a book fair at Barnes & Noble, and various book groups to promote inclusion and respect, by exposing the public to cultures of indigenous peoples from Oceania, the Americas, Africa, and Asia."



Carolyn Pascal

Nomination Statement: Carolyn believes the first step in achieving peace is to ensure that all people's basic needs are met. When she was 12, she saw a young mother struggling to cross the road holding a newborn and pushing a tattered umbrella stroller loaded down with a toddler and canned goods, and she decided she had to do something. She contacted the Greater Urbana Area food bank, reached out to retailers, and with the support of a former school counselor collected over 3600 urgently needed items. In 2018, she founded a nonprofit called Educate Girls to Eradicate Hunger, to spread the message that secondary schooling for girls can end the cycle of hunger in developing countries. She is now in year two of her ten-year plan to raise the funds needed to educate 100 girls: See more at: https://educategirlstoeradicatehunger.org. She has also launched a literature group called Indigenous People's Literature Society, to promote interest in indigenous cultures.

Designated Charity: Educate Girls to Eradicate Hunger is the nonprofit founded by Carolyn, as described above.

Walkersville High Madison Lancaster, Senior

"After discovering that Frederick County has numerous students who lack educational resources, I was inspired to bring engaging activities to these promising students. My program provides hands-on science experiments to children from underprivileged communities. I base the lessons on work done by women in STEM to further encourage the girls in my clubs. Sometimes we have women scientists come to engage with the students and speak about their work. These children have had an incredible effect on me. They love the sense of accomplishment they feel after completing the experiments. Seeing how bright they are gives me confidence and hope for their future."

Nomination Statement: Madison is very active as a school leader and community volunteer. She has undertaken mission trips to Ecuador and the Galapagos Islands, and loves learning about the world. She volunteers at the Walkersville Food Bank, helps plan the Walkersville Community Show, and coaches middle school recreational volleyball. She is currently helping coordinate a "Women in Science" club at the Boys and Girls Club of Frederick, and hopes to earn a degree in Agricultural Medical Biotechnology.

Designated Charity: Housing Authority of the City of Frederick, whose mission is to engage with Frederick's low and moderate income residents by providing a healthy foundation for economic self-sufficiency through employment and educational supports in safe, affordable housing.
